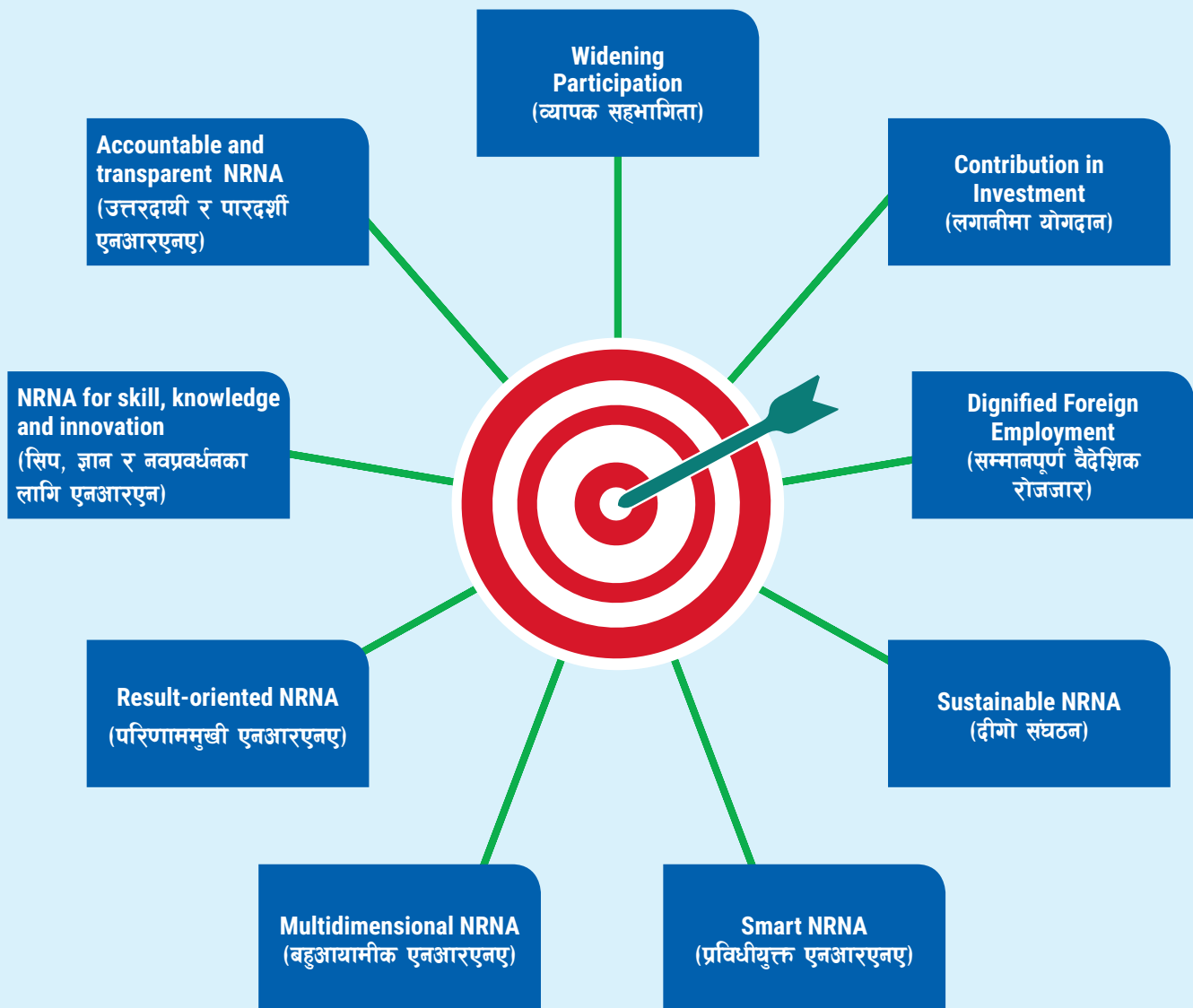

PREFACE



In the course of 17 years of development, Non-Resident Nepali Association (NRNA) has continued to evolve to be a dependable organization for Diaspora Nepali and a potential development partner of Nepal. In one hand, NRNA is serving Nepali Diaspora in more than eighty-two countries. On the other, it is facilitating skill, knowledge and financial resources transfer and investment for the long-term prosperity of Nepal. NRNA is also actively participating in humanitarian activities at the time of dire needs brought by natural disasters and public health emergencies both inside and outside Nepal. We thank the Member Secretaries of all departments for their help in documenting the project details for corresponding departments. We are indebted to the Member Secretary of the Organizational Management Department Dr. Hari Dahal for his integral participation and contribution, from the beginning of this booklet to shaping it to its final version.

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INTRODUCTION

Non-Resident Nepali Association (NRNA) was established on 11 October 2003 as a non-profit organization to unite the Nepali Diaspora under a single platform. In the course of completing 17 years of its existence, NRNA is developing into a global organization. It has created a strong network of Nepali living around the world through the establishment of National Coordination Councils (NCCs) in eighty-two countries. Since its inception, NRNA is strengthened tremendously due to diversity of skills, knowledge and resources possessed by its members. Its role has also evolved from collating and bolstering the sentiment of Nepali Diaspora into becoming a potentially serious development partner of Nepal. To keep up with the expectation of growing diaspora population and fellow citizens, NRNA needs concomitant updating and upgrading in its vision and performance moving forward. NRNA is stepping into a modern era with new challenges on hand but with proportional opportunities on the horizon, where in, if managed properly, it has the potential to emerge as the first-of-its-kind diaspora network in the world. Transformation of NRNA into an exemplary global organization requires a great deal of efforts and endurance in envisioning and implementing simultaneous renovations in multiple fronts.

Long-term relevance of NRNA will highly depend on size and degree of participation of its members. NRNA has seen an urgent need to further expand its base by attracting wider interest of Nepali Diaspora. Current engagement of only about 2% of diaspora population in NRNA is not very promising. Failure to attract the attention of women, youths, academicians and professionals in NRNA will not assure a healthy future. NRNA has to start thinking about how to cater to second-generation Nepali Diaspora effectively. Due to dynamic socioeconomic changes in Nepal, technological revolution in the world, and diversity in geo-economics landscape in which Nepali Diaspora is thriving, NRNA has to take a multidimensional approach to earn diasporas' commitment and support. To win the unwavering trust of its current and potential future members, NRNA has to strictly adhere to the high standards of accountability and transparency in the organization. In the modern era, the most important metric used to gauge the success of organizations is the ultimate results they deliver; rather than the kind of sentiments they carry. Hence, NRNA has to swiftly transfigure itself into a result-oriented organization. In addition, the potency of an organization to deliver results largely depends on how affluent it is on the use of smart technology in its daily operations. Above all, existence and influence of an organization depends on the resources it has in its disposal. For the long-term sustainability of NRNA, it has to diversify the roots of its financial sources. Only through the wider base of resources it can fulfill its dream of significant investment in Nepal's economy. In addition, NRNA should also mobilize the skill, knowledge and expertise of its members as its complementary assets. Last but not the least, dignified foreign employment should stay at the heart of NRNA movement. Only the dignified diaspora can heighten the dignity of the organization.

With this vision in mind, the executive committee of NRNA International Coordination Council (ICC) for the term 2019-2021 has decided to reinvigorate its Initiatives Implementation Framework by following a more logical, streamlined and structured approach. To achieve effective outcomes, NRNA ICC has adopted decentralized project management strategy through the creation and involvement of departments. A total of eight such departments are formed to efficiently manage NRNA projects for the upcoming two years. Departments identify and propose projects to Projects Review, Selection and Adoption Committee, which will adopt the projects after thorough review. Execution of adopted projects will be conducted by the departments under the leadership of corresponding department head, namely, Flagship Projects (Mr. Kumar Panta, President); Foreign Employment and Welfare of NRNs (Dr. Badri K.C., VP); Investment, Trade and Nepal Promotion (Mr. Arjun Shrestha, VP); Skill, Knowledge and Technology Transfer (Mr. Mana K.C., VP); Philanthropy and Humanitarian Assistance (Mr. Sonam Lama, VP); Women & Youths (Mrs. Rabina Thapa, VP; Ms. Bhoma Limbu, Women Coordinator; Mr. Himal Gurung, Youth Coordinator); Organization Management (Dr Hem Raj Sharma, General Secretary; Mr. Gouri Raj Joshi, Secretary; Mr. RK Sharma, Secretary; Mr. DB Chhetri, Spokesperson); and NRNA Foundation and Financial Sustainability (Mr. Mahesh Shrestha, Treasurer; Mr. Lok Dahal, Joint-Treasurer). In the third Face-to-Face meeting/71st NRNA ICC meeting in Pokhara, these departments were

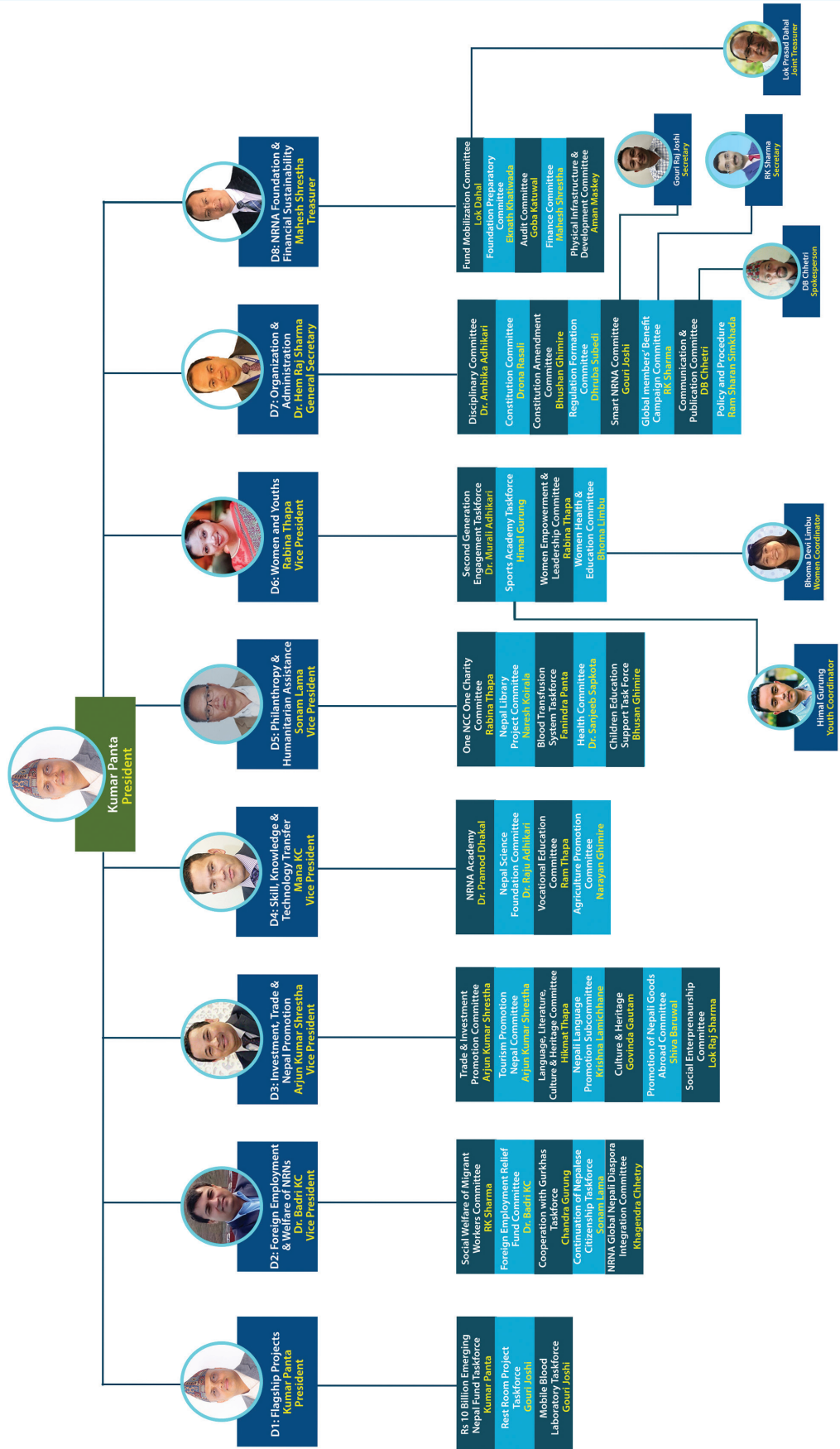
asked to present projects to be executed with respective Terms of Reference (ToR) detailing concrete action plans and timeline. A culmination of these proposals will set the motion of NRNA for the coming two years.

The departments will follow the following Guiding Principles and Procedures for their project management:

1. Manage NRNA projects using decentralized project management approach.
2. Execute decentralized approach under specific departments lead by designated IES members.
3. Department heads to present projects to be pursued with corresponding Terms of Reference (ToR) detailing two-year objectives of the corresponding departments, concrete project action plans, timeline and expected measurable outcomes.
4. Each department to enroll interested NRNA ICC members, with expertise pertinent to its scope and objectives, into the steering committee of that department.
5. Each department to assign concrete role and responsibility to all steering committee members so that it can optimally utilize their expertise in the management of projects.
6. Each department is to propose necessary committees/subcommittees/task force to execute proposed projects. Departments are to identify advisors, chair, co-chairs and members to constitute those entities. NRNA ICC is to approve those committees/subcommittees/task forces after review.
7. Each department to identify and manage all financial resources required to implement the projects proposed under corresponding department. Departments can seek individual or institutional donations, deposit under NRNA accounts, and release of funds for projects as per the financial regulation guideline. NRNA ICC is to form financial By-law to facilitate the formation of financial regulation guideline.
8. NRNA ICC's Projects Review, Selection and Adoption Committee will review impact of all projects at the end of current term to help recommend project continuation or discontinuation in the future terms.

NRN INVESTMENT FUND (NRNIF)

1. BACKGROUND :

NRNA has set up few flagship projects in the term 2019-21 to directly support in the socio-economic development of the nation. One of such initiatives is collective investment of NPR 10 Billion which will be mobilized to develop infrastructure, electricity, roads, banking, fintech, telecommunications, railways, irrigation, water supply and sanitation, ports and airports, storing facilities, and oil and gas pipelines in Nepal. The NRNIF seeks to achieve its investment objective by investing primarily in equity of infrastructure companies. The Fund defines infrastructure companies as those companies that derive at least 65% of their operating earnings from the ownership or operation of infrastructure assets. The Fund explains infrastructure assets as the physical structures, networks and systems of transportation, energy, water, waste, and communication. The Fund typically invests in companies that can adjust the fees, it charges from customers and counterparties in line with inflation, in accordance with contractual terms or regulation, or through renegotiation due to the essential nature and pricing power of infrastructure assets. Under normal circumstances, the Fund invests at least 80% of its net assets (plus any borrowings for investment purposes) on start-up equity of infrastructure companies and/or in publicly traded equity securities.

2. OBJECTIVES:

- ♦ Create opportunities to various small and large NRN investors to invest in projects that are likely to improve standard of living of Nepalese population and generate employment and provide permanent sources of income
- ♦ Demonstrate and maintain adequate administrative capacity and are realistic, both in terms of implementation and by obtaining measurable results
- ♦ Establishment of an urban infrastructure financing mechanism utilizing the collective investment scheme, it will utilize available resources, supervise and co-finance urban infrastructure subprojects
- ♦ Assist other partners to improve infrastructure investment planning
- ♦ Invest through Equity participation and in various identified infrastructure projects
- ♦ Establishment of Infrastructure Development Bank

MODEL REST ROOMS (MRR)

1. BACKGROUND:

Toilets are a basic necessity but often taken for granted by those who have regular access. Public Toilets are facilities which are provided for the floating population/general public in places such as markets, bus stations, tourist areas or other public areas where there are considerable number of human movements. Poor public toilet services are one of the most visible symptoms of inadequate urban sanitation services in Nepal. The pace of urbanization and transit facilities has not been matched by sanitation amenities in cities. Cities, realizing the importance of hygienic public toilets are preparing to add new public toilets and manage the existing ones better with the surging demands. Also, the sanitation needs of female and people with different abilities are significantly different from those of the male; there is a need to integrate a gender and ability dimension while planning and designing public toilet blocks as well as while developing institutional arrangements for their operation and maintenance.

NRNA, ever since its establishment in 2003; has envisioned pooling and utilizing the resources at the disposal of the Nepali Diaspora for the betterment of the motherland and has promoted and implemented this concept through various socio-economic activities. Hence, NRNA has proposed to cities to utilize its resources in constructing model sample public toilets under the Build Operate Transfer (BOT) technology with a validity of five years as specified in the ***“Design Catalogue for Construction of Public Toilet in Kathmandu Metropolitan City Volume II”***; such that cities will be able to replicate the proven models and enhance its capacities in the sustained management of public sanitation facilities it is going to develop. These new public toilets will be children, women and differently abled people friendly. Each public toilet will be equipped with sanitary pads vending machine, adequate water, aeration, electricity, a hygienic and convenient place to defecate.

The TOR has been developed recognizing these aspects considering the usual demands placed on a high-profile, high traffic and heavily used facility requiring well planned and designed facility with utmost importance given to the issues like cleanliness and dryness, ventilation, easy maintenance, carefully planned layout with maintenance in mind, friendly to persons differently able and special needs, gender friendly, safety and securities, smart, contemporary and environment friendly features, space for advertisement and additional revenue generation if required.



2. OBJECTIVES:

- Construction of 4 public restroom in 4 different areas – Kalanki, Tinkune, Narayanghar, Jorpati.
- Operate the restrooms for 5 years under the BOT scheme.
- Run pilot public restrooms in cities with high demand and good flow of public.
- Grant access to general public to utilize well equipped public restrooms with proper sanitation facilities.

5. TERMS & CONDITIONS (including working modality):

- ◆ Cities to provide appropriate and adequate land as well as facilitate the smooth operation of the project.
- ◆ The facility is to be constructed with the approval of cities as per the Abstract of Cost, Detailed Estimates, Architectural & Structural Drawing submitted by Y.A. Engineering Consultancy on January, 2020 to NRNA and not exceeding Rupees 60,45, 541.20.
- ◆ Any variation occurred should be evaluated by a valuator nominated by NRNA and prior written approval must be taken from NRNA authority before implementing it.
- ◆ Financial Bylaws of NRNA must be strictly followed in making all procurement activities.
- ◆ NRNA is to fund the construction and operate the facility for 5 years under the BOT scheme.
- ◆ 100% recovery should be targeted for annual operation and maintenance cost considering revenue income from sources such as levy from the use of the facility and advertisement.
- ◆ Apart from physical monitoring of the facility; there should be monitoring of feedbacks from the users. Users should be requested to evaluate the performance through questionnaire containing different aspects of operation and maintenance within a range of 1-10 (1 being the minimum and 10 the maximum). A point of 7 or less should be considered serious lapse by the agency and action should be taken to improve it.
- ◆ Facility should have CCTV installed at important points to identify security aspects as well as in identification of lapses by the agency in the maintenance of the facility.
- ◆ Modalities for the Operation & Management of the facility including levying the user should be decided in consultation with Cities and through an open bidding while selecting the service provider.
- ◆ The levy to user is a critical step to be decided and will be impacted by the amount of subsidies obtained from CITIES as well as the selection of the operator. This decision shall at all times be aligned towards a uniform city level strategy applicable for all public toilets.
- ◆ There should be a fortnightly meeting between the service provider and the NRNA authority to review the comments received from the users and to take appropriate action to rectify them.
- ◆ A tie up with women's groups marketing sanitary pads can also be worked out to facilitate sale of sanitary pads in the women's facility through automatic vending machine/s.
- ◆ Provision of covered bins for proper disposal of sanitary napkins must be made in each cubicle in the women's facility. The operation and maintenance plan must include a mechanism for the proper disposal of the sanitary napkins.
- ◆ The facility must be installed with a mechanism to collect and store rain water.
- ◆ As far as possible digital electronic device should be used for record keeping.
- ◆ If need be; the premises of the facility could be used for generating extra revenue for the upkeep of the facility.

5.1 OPERATION & MANAGEMENT (O & M) MODALITY:

- ◆ O & M responsibilities shall be given to third party through a Service Contract.
- ◆ The facilities/assets are to be given out to a private service providing agency to manage in lieu of a service fee (revised annually and up to 5 years).
- ◆ Service providing agencies managed by NRNs may be given priority.
- ◆ The service providing agency should have the necessary staff and tools to supervise and maintain the facility and to monitor its technical, commercial/financial performance.
- ◆ The service provider is responsible for investments for repairs and maintenance of the facilities. The performance parameters will be specified separately in the service contract document. The obligations

of the service provider will clearly be defined and the rewards are based on a fixed plus variable component (or deduction for lack of performance).

- ♦ The service provider may be responsible for generation and utilization of biogas from the facility as a sustainable option. In this case, biogas produced can be used for electricity generation.
- ♦ The service provider cannot use this facility as a retail outlet for selling any product or service other than specified in the service contract document.
- ♦ Maintain record book displaying the tariff sheet, cashbook and the number of people using the public sanitation facility along with financial transactions.
- ♦ The service provider is responsible for paying the monthly water and electricity bills.
- ♦ If damage to the property of the facility can be attributed to the negligence of the service provider it shall be charged for all damage repair costs.

5.2. STAFFING:

The facility must have a caretaker and two attendants, one male and one female for their respective blocks. Presence of a women attendant would ensure that the women feel comfortable and safe while using the facility.

RESPONSIBILITY OF THE CARETAKER

- ♦ Overall O & M and upkeep of the facilities.
- ♦ The attendants must inspect each toilet and the urinal once every hour and clean them if they are dirty. During peak hours inspection intervals have to be reduced. Spot cleaning outside the cubicles should be increased respectively.
- ♦ Regulate the use in a “first come first serve basis”.
- ♦ Receipt and issue of cleaning materials and equipment.
- ♦ Issue receipt against user levy.
- ♦ Maintaining the complaint register.
- ♦ Monitoring and reporting of service levels.

5.3. MONITORING & FOLLOW-UP

Regular monitoring of the facility lies with the service agency responsible. Such monitoring should be random but, in a week, or so. Monitoring should include aspects such as cleanliness, availability of adequate water, status of electric power points, status of minor repairs, major repairs, waste disposal system, behavior of staff with users of facility, level of maintenance of building etc. Monthly monitoring should be conducted by NRNA & CITY authorities.

NRNA representative shall monitor the usage, provision of services and cleanliness of the facility at regular intervals. The following aspects should be considered while monitoring the facility.

- ♦ Cleanliness of toilet block, individual cells, drains and surrounding space.
- ♦ Provision of services like water supply, lighting etc.
- ♦ Provision and functionality of doors, handles, flush etc.
- ♦ Provision of supplies and tools.
- ♦ Management and operating schedule.
- ♦ Site safety and security.

- ◆ Functionality of the septic tanks, soak well.
- ◆ Overall repair & maintenance.
- ◆ Performance of caretakers / service providers.

Evaluation and monitoring of facility is essential to improve services. Regular monitoring as per the service contract is essential and this should be ensured by undertaking unannounced inspections. NRNA authority may conduct routine monitoring checks of the following items with the recommended frequency:

- ◆ As and when required: Effluent discharge arrangements, sludge levels and de-sludging.
- ◆ Daily: Facility block exterior and interior cleanliness, availability of utilities, health and safety hazards, other nuisance factors.
- ◆ Weekly: Site safety and security.
- ◆ Quarterly: Repairs, structural integrity, rate of usage and user satisfaction.
- ◆ Monthly: Provision of supplies and tools, public health awareness, management, operating schedule.
- ◆ Review and evaluate the existing conditions of the facility and submit monthly report to NRNA and City authorities.

5.4 PROPOSED LOCATIONS:

MOBILE BLOOD BUS (MBB)

1. BACKGROUND:

"Mobile Blood Bank (MBB) Project" is a quality enhancement Project of NRNA Blood Transfusion and Transfer System (BTTS) for Regional Blood Bank of Nepal Red Cross Society (NRCS) Chitwan. Chitwan, a medical hub, is facing lot of challenges in providing quality blood related services time and again. The harsh climatic condition of Chitwan adds challenges in blood collection during different seasons - summer, winter and monsoon. Hence, to eliminate such climatic barriers to conduct blood related services this MBB Project is planned. This MBB project is a mobile blood bank in wheels which will have closed space with required facilities in maintained temperature. The cost of project is estimated about NRs. One Crore.

This project is adopted as one of the flagship projects of NRNA- ICC 2019-21 as this will be the first of its kind project which will be a solution for effective, efficient and safer blood management for Nepal and directly make positive impact in the lives of general public. This initiation is being supported by the Nepalese Diaspora all over the world. NRCS Chitwan Blood Bank will take charge of the operation of this project and is expected to be operational by end of the October 2020. This project is being conducted jointly by NRNA and NRCS Chitwan District Chapter in support of Chitwan Municipality. Institutional collaboration for the good cause like such can be considered an example.

FOREIGN EMPLOYMENT & NRN'S WELFARE DEPARTMENT

1. BACKGROUND:

Every year, large numbers of Nepalese migrate to different parts of world in search of employment and better opportunities. Government of Nepal has listed 108 destinations for migrant workers to work through official channels and manpower agencies. Around 5% of these migrant workers are women. Most of these migrant workers are unskilled or semi- skilled workers. Majority of such migrants are involved in very difficult, low paid and risky jobs and face many problems. Each day around 5 Nepalese migrants die in foreign land and there is lack of official records on the large numbers of Nepalese who are physically and psychologically disabled and suffer physical, mental and sexual assaults in workplace. Enhancing skills of the migrant workers and providing them information on destination countries could ease many such painful incidents.

Apart from this, there also many NRNs engaged in white color jobs and businesses. The problems faced by NRNs vary and there is a need to address diverse issues for their welfare as one of the goals of NRNA is to work in the interest and welfare of NRNs.

1.1 DEFINITION:

Literally speaking, NRN refers to the Nepalese staying abroad in pursuit of employment, business, study and so on. But according to the NRN Act 2064 and NRN Regulation 2066, NRNs are those Nepalese, who are staying outside the country excluding the SAARC regions for more than two years or those people of Nepali origin who have obtained the citizenship of other countries known as Persons of Nepalese Origin (PNO) fall under the definition.

Similarly, an employment opportunity with certain wage under certain terms and conditions undertaken by an individual beyond ones national, political or geographical boundary is called foreign employment. The Foreign Employment Act 2064 has defined it as "Worker's employed in a foreign country". Therefore, foreign employment has remained and will always remain as a major area of activity of NRNA and it is also one of the goals of NRNA.

1.2. IMPORTANCE OF FOREIGN EMPLOYMENT:

Foreign Employment has remained as backbone of the national economy since long. Currently, the remittance of the NRNs occupies a significant chunk of Nepal's Gross Domestic Product (GDP). It accounts for around 33 percent of the GDP. In fact, foreign employment has increased the foreign currency reserve in the central bank; contributing to adequate availability of liquidity. It has also helped to maintain the balance of payment. Thus, Nepal has now turned to be a remittance dependent economy.

NRNs are the major contributors of the remittance, which has been the backbone of the country's economy. On the other hand, it has increased the living standard of the respective families and the loved ones of each NRN and energized the economy of Nepal. More importantly, foreign employment has helped to create a pool of technologically skilled and experienced workforce who can contribute a great deal after they return to Nepal for the socio-economic transformation of the motherland. Thus, knowledge, skill, capital, technological know-how of NRNs achieved during the course of foreign employment may be of great importance in the shaping of new Nepal and there are many such examples.

1.3 ROLE OF NRNA IN RELATION TO FOREIGN EMPLOYMENT:

NRNs are the major source of authority and foundation of NRNA's activities. Therefore, safeguarding the common interest of all the NRNs residing in the foreign land is of great concern to NRNA. In this light, NRNA can play a very significant role to mitigate the problems faced by fellow compatriots.

1.4 MAJOR CHALLENGES FACED IN FOREIGN EMPLOYMENT:

- ◆ Unnecessary exploitation of poor, innocent and ignorant people in the name of service charge.
- ◆ Use of fake documents (visa, employment contract etc.) to cheat and make aspirants easy prey.
- ◆ Use of forged passports (change of picture in the passport where a person flies to his destination on another individual's passport only with his photograph).
- ◆ Provision of middlemen without proper monitoring and evaluation of the pros and cons of such provision.
- ◆ Human trafficking (people are promised job in one country but taken to another country with false documents and illegally).
- ◆ Alteration of promised job and salary and other facilities after reaching destination countries.
- ◆ Lack of orientation; though there is the provision of proper pre-departure orientation to all the workers but this has been grossly violated by all sides (manpower agencies and the workers themselves).
- ◆ The Government of Nepal has formulated labor-friendly rules and regulations. But the implementation and monitoring part is laid-back.
- ◆ Amending and changing the rules and regulations associated with foreign employment without consulting with the stakeholder and also implementing it immediately without making the target audience aware or giving them time to adjust accordingly.
- ◆ Lack of social security for the migrant workers.
- ◆ Lack of skill and information about the job and information about the destination countries.

2. OBJECTIVES:

The objective of this department is to lobby with government, various committees of parliament & stakeholders, mobilize the resources of NRNs for the welfare of Migrant Workers & NRNs.

FOREIGN EMPLOYMENT AND MIGRANT WORKERS WELFARE (FEMWW)

1. BACKGROUND:

Foreign employment is not any new jargon among the Nepalese at home and abroad today. Officially, the history of foreign employment reflects that opting for foreign employment began with the establishment of First Gorkha Regiment by the British East India Company after the end of Anglo-Nepal war in 24 April 1815. Even before this particular date, Nepalese youths used to go to India, Bhutan, Burma (Myanmar) and Pakistan to for their livelihood. Together with globalization and gradual liberalization of the political system in the country, larger number of Nepalese youths and families started to leave the country in search of better opportunities to support their families and the loved ones. Similarly, climax of post industrialization period in America and Europe and Petro-dollar's excessive reserves in the Middle East region has opened up opportunities to the Nepalese low-income youths for foreign employment.

The number of such Nepalese has increased massively and reached more than 5 million and the government has recognized those Nepalese as Non-Resident Nepalese. The Non-Resident Nepalese Association (NRNA); established with major double objectives of safeguarding the interest of the Nepalese Diasporas and contributing in the socio-economic transformation of the country with the motto of "For Nepali By Nepali" has always included the issues related to the migrant worker as priority in its agendas and is utilizing its means and resources under its disposal to make foreign employment safe, dignified and organized. NRNA has formed Foreign Employment and Migrant Workers Welfare Committee under the Foreign Employment and Welfare of NRNs Department to lead and give direction to these activities.

2. OBJECTIVES:

- ♦ Mobilize NRNA network and linkage to improve the foreign employment situations.
- ♦ Organizing awareness campaign at the national level and in the respective destination countries on the importance of orientation, language proficiency and other job-related training and information while perusing for foreign employment.
- ♦ Providing advice and suggestions to the government to formulate foreign employment friendly laws and regulations.
- ♦ Prepare a white paper encompassing various problems faced and recommend remedial measures.
- ♦ Request Government of Nepal for a committee on Foreign Employment; including interrelated government officials and NRNA representative
- ♦ Prepare a skill bank of returnee migrant workers.
- ♦ Work to develop and implement social security package for migrant workers.
- ♦ Encourage vocational & technical education and engage returnee migrant workers to better educate people about the jobs and destination countries.
- ♦ Work together with the Government and other similar organizations to control human trafficking.
- ♦ Arrangement of contingency fund to support the migrant workers in distress.
- ♦ Organizing awareness campaigns through NCCs in respective countries regarding socio-cultural behavior, respect of rules and regulations of the hosting country, causes of death and life-threatening diseases, traffic rules and regulations etc.
- ♦ Work in close coordination with related government official and labor desk of the Nepalese missions abroad to collect data on demography of Nepali Diaspora living around the world.

FOREIGN EMPLOYMENT RELIEF FUND (FERF)

1. BACKGROUND:

NRNA Foreign Employment Relief Fund has been created to mobilize funds for the welfare and security of migrant workers efficiently and immediately as and when needed. This fund will act as a basket fund and FERF aims to collect 50 million rupees. Annual interest collected from the fund will be mobilized for the welfare of migrant workers. This document is especially designed to develop a mechanism to disburse the fund to the targeted group or individual and this committee has been established to undertake the relief, rescue and skill enhancement operations of the Nepalese migrant workers by creating and mobilizing a dedicated separate fund.

2. OBJECTIVES:

- ♦ Create separate fund to work for the welfare of Nepali Migrants and Safe Migration.
- ♦ Raise required funds by organizing different programs and events and collecting contribution from generous groups and individuals.
- ♦ Reduce vulnerabilities and provide services to Migrant Workers.
- ♦ Collaborate with Nepal Government including Foreign Employment Board, Legal Defense Foundations and other national and international stakeholders to make synergy to meet the objective
- ♦ Conduct research and collect data of Nepalese serving in Prison abroad.
- ♦ Funds for supporting Nepalese Migrants who are serving in prison in possible ways be it legal, financial or moral - psychosocial counselling
- ♦ Funds to organize awareness program, skill-based trainings and orientations to the potential Nepalese migrant workers.
- ♦ If required; form a Foreign Employment Relief Fund Management Committee including government representatives.
- ♦ Finalize Foreign Employment Relief Fund Management By-laws.

4. COLLECTION OF THE FUND:

This fund will consist of:

- ♦ Grants and financial support provided by Nepal Government based on the amount of remittance received, contribution from Foreign Employment Board (FEB) and other individuals or associations.
- ♦ Contribution from NRNs, NRNA and its affiliations established in different countries – National Coordination Councils.
- ♦ Contribution received from different national and international organizations or individuals.
- ♦ Savings from different events of NRNA such as conferences, meeting, fund raising activities and charities.

5. FUND MOBILIZATION SECTORS:

- ♦ To dispatch the dead body of the Nepali migrants from destination country incase funds cannot be generated from any sources.
- ♦ To help Nepali migrant return home, if they get seriously injured or handicapped, during the period of foreign employment and funds cannot be generated from any other sources
- ♦ If any Nepalese migrant worker faces serious false accusations and gets detained in foreign land and lacks support for legal consultation from any authority, then legal support is to be provided.
- ♦ Immediate rescue of Nepalese migrant worker from the country that suffers from natural calamities, mishaps or political instability when other source cannot be found.
- ♦ Provide support, shelter and any other basic facilities required for the victimized Nepali migrants working abroad.
- ♦ Priority of this fund will be given to deprived female migrants.
- ♦ For skill enhancement of migrant workers and dissemination of essential information.

6. RESPONSIBILITIES AND RIGHTS:

- ♦ Create collective initial endowment fund.
- ♦ Generate and collect funds from different sectors.
- ♦ Modify the policy of mobilization of fund as needed.

- ◆ Supervise the usages of the fund as per the objectives and policy.
- ◆ Set work plan for mobilizing the fund.
- ◆ Request for release of the fund, after the analysis of the need of the fund requested from different NCC, to be approved by ICC.
- ◆ Report to the NRNA ICC regularly on the usage of the fund and updates.
- ◆ Revolving fund concept and invest in possible sectors for good returns as approved by ICC.
- ◆ Organize meeting at least once in 3 months or when needed.

7. PROCEDURE OF FUND MOBILIZATION:

- ◆ Written application of such cases should be registered at the NRNA Secretariat by the relatives of the victims, submitting all the details of the victim and case details.
- ◆ The application should clearly state the kind of support sought from NRNA, in case of financial help, the total amount required to free the victim or bring him/her back to Nepal should be mentioned.
- ◆ The request of fund release should be made based on the decision of the FERF Committee via the Chair to the IES/ICC through written request for approval by the committee chair and the members.
- ◆ The committee will take decision and forward the approval of the expense amount based on the recommendation given by NCC of destination Country to the IES/ICC.
- ◆ NRNA will contribute 15% of the total requirement for any cases upon recommendation from the concerned NCC and after approval from the FERF committee; it will be forwarded to IES/ICC for the approval of fund release. For special case which need urgent attention, NRNA can support total amount upon approval of IES.
- ◆ The funds will be disbursed through FERF committee in consultation with the NCCs in destination countries or Nepali missions as advised by the IES/ICC.
- ◆ To utilize this fund in any particular country to rescue migrants, the NCC of particular country should contribute possible amount to this fund. The FERF will recommend to the IES/ICC to add in the matching fund to execute the rescue operation. The FERF will not support the NCCs and their cases if the NCCs do not financially contribute to the fund.
- ◆ The implementing party of NCCs/missions should submit invoices and supporting documents for the funds used, to the FERF committee, which will be forwarded to the ICC for approval.
- ◆ New or additional funds will be allocated to the executing organization or affiliation only after the settlement of previous grants, with proper report and records.
- ◆ The FERF Committee will be accountable, if the NCC or affiliations in different countries fails to utilize fund properly as per the prescribed rules.
- ◆ To supervise the usage of the funds transferred through any medium, NRNA ICC or the FERF Committee will have right to provide required directives in such matters.
- ◆ Such directives should be followed by the implementing party
- ◆ FERF Committee should be responsible to keep records and final account analysis of the fund usage through NRNA Secretariat that is to be submitted to the ICC.
- ◆ The fund should be kept in a separate account created under the name of NRNA Foreign Employment Relief Fund. The funds will be solely managed by the FERF Committee through the guidance of ICC.
- ◆ Duplication of the tasks should be avoided.
- ◆ The funds should not be misused by any party and should not be used in the interest of any person or individual.

- ♦ NRNA FERF will follow up with the concern authority about the cases and keep track of the updates of the cases until the victim is set free and brought back to Nepal.
- ♦ NRNA FERF will support by providing counselling to such returnees and help in possible ways to reintegrate returnees in community.
- ♦ Three monthly report should be submitted to the ICC through the HOD.

CONTINUATION OF CITIZENSHIP (CNC)

1. BACKGROUND:

One of the main goals of Non-Resident Nepali Association (NRNA) from its very beginning was to ensure Continuity of Nepali Citizenship (CNC) rights to Foreign Nationals of Nepali Origin (FNNOs). As a result of years of efforts and advocacy, the Constitution of Nepal 2072 has finally provisioned for Non-Resident Nepali Citizenship with economic, cultural and social rights. While there is no doubt that this is a big achievement, there is still a long way to go.

The main focus now is to ensure that proper regulations are in place that ensure the provision made are implemented according to the spirit of the Constitution. The committee will work to facilitate the promulgation of acts to ensure that FNNOs are able to exercise the rights as provisioned by the constitution. Since citizenship is a sensitive issue, the committee will work carefully on this matter through a range of activities which have been outlined below. The committee will follow the Terms of Reference accordingly.

2. OBJECTIVES:

Coordinate as well as facilitate in the formulation of Act & By-laws in accordance with the provision made for NRN Citizenship in the Constitution of Nepal-2072 to ensure that NRNs are able to exercise their right hassle free. Following are its objectives:

- ♦ To conduct detail study and analysis on the role and right of the NRN Citizens as provisioned in the constitution and work in the interest of establishing the fundamental right of the Non-Resident Nepali Citizenship.
- ♦ To advocate about dissolution of Clause 291 of Nepal's constitution which has omitted the fundamental right of permanent Non-Resident Nepali.
- ♦ Promulgation of Citizenship amendment bill incorporating the suggestions made by NRNA by parliament.
- ♦ Enactment of rules and procedures so that the deserving NRNs can acquire the NRN citizenship in seamless manner.
- ♦ Continued lobbying in support of citizenship to NRNs with full rights (Dual Citizenship allowed).
- ♦ Prepare suggestions on other NRNA related laws and rules and work for their enactment.
- ♦ Develop position papers of NRNA on issues of citizenship through research consultation and dialogue if required.
- ♦ Identify best practices regarding dual citizenship, diaspora rights and communicate the same to Nepal Government, political parties and citizens at large.
- ♦ Identify the drawbacks of the present laws (Constitution/Acts/Rules) and work for their improvement.
- ♦ Ensure that the Nepalese nationals residing outside of Nepal enjoy full rights as national living in Nepal and face no discrimination in enjoying their fundamental rights (like employment) on account of their residential status and other issue.

4. WORKING POLICY:

- ◆ The committee will collect the suggestions from different sources and discuss in the meeting. The discussed agendas will be submitted to ICC.
- ◆ According to need, the meeting of taskforce will be online or face to face.
- ◆ The decisions and progress report will be submitted to ICC.
- ◆ The committee can submit proposal for change in Terms of Reference according to the need.

5. DETAILED WORK-PLAN:

• Formulation of team for legal advice

One of the first activities of the committee will be to formulate a team of legal advisors who will be crucial in providing legal suggestions on these issues. Along with providing legal advice, the team will help in providing answers to any legal questions that will be asked to NRN on these issues.

• Drafting of position paper

To ensure that the act is introduced in line with the provision made in the constitution, the committee will prepare a draft bill with the help of the legal advisory team. This will be sent to NRN members for suggestions; if and when required.

- **Lobbying and advocacy through different stakeholders**

The committee will conduct formal and informal discussions as well as lobby with representatives of various ministries and bodies including Home Ministry, Ministry of Law & Justice, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Constitutional and Parliamentary Committees and major political parties for formations of appropriate laws.

- **Discussion with relevant ministry**

Since the issue of citizenship falls under Ministry of Home, the committee will advocate for the speedy presentation of the NRN Citizenship Bill in the parliament by holding dialog at different levels in the Ministry of Home and other stakeholders.

- **Interaction with members of parliamentary committees**

The committee's efforts will be to hold interactions with the Chairman as well as members of various Committees under whose jurisdiction the drafting of the proposed law will fall to ensure that the legal process regarding NRN Citizenship is undertaken swiftly and immediately.

- **Internal discussion**

The committee will hold regular informal discussions among members of the Committee regarding the issues of NRN Citizenship and amending NRN Act 2064 & Bylaws 2066 including Clause 291 of Nepal's Constitution 2072.

- **Discussion with major leaders**

To ensure that the issue of NRN Citizenship gets support from all the parliamentarians, the committee will hold meetings and discussions with leaders of major political parties to inform them about the PNO's expectations and the developments taking place.

- **Provision of focal person**

To ensure coordination, facilitation and communication with various stakeholders and to inform the committee members about the legal process as well as to inform the committee about the steps to be taken, a focal person will be appointed in Kathmandu.

- **Media mobilization**

Media will be mobilized to assure public support and give positive message regarding the issue of NRN Citizenship. The media will help disseminate news to create a positive image around these issues.

- **Documentation**

Since the issue of NRN Citizenship has been an issue of focus since the formation of NRNA, efforts of NRNs as well as the taskforce/committee, which have been published in the form of print, photo and video will be documented in a video documentary archive.

- **Budget**

In line with the NRNA's policy of committee generating their own fund, the committee will generate or manage the fund from their own resources.

6. GUIDELINES:

- ♦ Members of the committee will need to inform the committee Coordinator before undertaking any work regarding the matter of NRN Citizenship to ensure uniformity and coordination. The (HOD) Head of Department, focal person as well as the CEO of NRNA in Kathmandu also needs to be pre-informed about all key activities.

- ♦ Any information should be first shared within the committee members, Head of Department and only then formally shared outside after discussion.
- ♦ In case of requirement of any information, the focal person should be contacted. However, discussion needs to held with the Chair and Head of Department to decide whether the information can be made public or not.
- ♦ Complete information should be gathered on any issue before speaking in the media.
- ♦ The committee will maintain communication and coordination with NRNA President and its members through the committee chair or HOD.
- ♦ Members should carry out all the responsibilities entrusted by the committee.

WELFARE OF GURKHAS (WG)

1. BACKGROUND:

NRNA has been formally recognized by the Nepal Government in its constitution. Its network currently spans over 82 countries worldwide and is growing. Recently elected working committee is setting its agenda for next two years. A Task Force in a form of a sub-committee has been endorsed by NRNA International Co-ordination Committee (ICC) to liaise, understand and assist Gurkhas to resolve their outstanding grievances. Although the majority of British Gurkhas reside in the UK, they are thinly dispersed around the world; therefore, membership should be chosen to represent all parts of the world. This task force will remain active until full resolution of the Gurkha issues or until the re-election of next NRNA working committee whichever comes first.

The makeup of the Nepali diaspora in the UK is different to that of other countries in the world as majority of Nepalese residing are either serving or ex Gurkhas and their families. Although Nepali population from other background is growing in the UK, it is relatively smaller compared to that of the Gurkhas. Since NRNA's inception in the UK it has been led by Ex Gurkha soldiers many times. Issues of the Gurkhas; therefore, sits in the heart of NRNA UK and it is only right and proper that NRNA takes their issues forward to the highest level for its resolution once and for all.

The following are the key issues, amongst others, that Gurkhas have been fighting for years:

- ♦ **Pension:** Equal rights of pension compared to their British counterparts. Although the pension rights are the same for those who were enlisted after Oct 1993 but for those who enlisted prior to this date only certain percentage (23-36%) of their pre 1997 service is counted toward their pension thereby face severe disadvantage. There are other complex issues related to Gurkha pensions which will be discussed through a separate paper.
- ♦ **Citizenship:** Continuation of their Nepali citizenship. One must have a Nepali citizenship to join the British Gurkhas and remain so during their active service. They should not be deprived of their Nepali citizenship because they reluctantly obtain British citizenship in order to take well-earned state benefit of the country whom they served most of their working lives.
- ♦ **Membership:** There is an ongoing debate, amongst Gurkhas, whether Gurkhas are de facto NRNA members or they are different to the rest of the Nepalese residing in the UK. This debate should be resolved through an awareness campaign and mutual understanding.

2. OBJECTIVES:

The objective of this committee is to support existing Gurkha pressure groups who are fighting for their rights by engaging the Nepali and the British government at appropriate level and in the meantime, try to promote unity, solidarity and cohesion between various Gurkha struggle groups to bring meaningful end to this inequality.

The department envisages to develop entrepreneurship, promote investment & Trade, promote Nepali goods abroad and Nepal Promotion via Language, Culture & Tourism for Nepal's Socio-Economic Growth and Development.

2. OBJECTIVES:

- ◆ Promote Nepali products abroad through different schemes and plans, also hold dialogue with various multinational companies in creating better channels to trade Nepali products.
- ◆ Coordinate with NRNA affiliates, relevant community and different forums related to the cultural and heritage globally; to obtain the best results to promote and preserve them.

3. COMMITTEE/ TASKFORCE/PROJECT:

- ◆ Investment and Trade Promotion Committee.
- ◆ Social Entrepreneurship Development Committee.

1. BACKGROUND:

- ◆ Draft manual (Stepwise Guide) for doing trade in Nepal and bringing in investment in Nepal from NRNs and Foreign Investors.
- ◆ Collect feedbacks from NRNs and Foreign Investors regarding investment and trade in Nepal and use them to facilitate reforms in economic governance in the country.
- ◆ Conduct research on investment made by NRNs in Nepal and develop a database of NRN investment in Nepal.
- ◆ Arrange and Facilitate visits of foreign business delegation to Nepal and Nepali business delegation to different parts of the world for establishing mutual business linkages.

1. BACKGROUND:

NTB also promotes Nepal as "the next generation mountain destination for weekend breaks, adventure holidays, and lifetime experiences for people who live in cosmopolitan cities and travel internationally". Consistency is a perquisite for branding. Hence, all communication and promotional strategies should revolve around these themes.

In line with the spirit of its motto "For Nepali by Nepali" one of the objectives of the NRNA is to "Preserve and promote Nepali culture and tourism globally". To fulfill this objective the "Tourism Promotion of Nepal (TPN)" Committee has been formed as part of an endeavor that NRNA has continuously undertaken from the start of its inception. TPN will give continuity and support the strategies that have already been adopted as well as incorporate various activities included under the Action Plan of the committee.

GLOBAL KNOWLEDGE CONVENTION (GKC)

1. BACKGROUND:

Non-Resident Nepali Association (NRNA), an organization of millions of Nepalese residing outside Nepal, is an active partner of the Government of Nepal (GoN) and of Nepali people in advancing the country's aspirations for socio-economic development. Since its inception in 2003, NRNA has attempted to bring together diaspora resources to assist in Nepal's development efforts. In pursuit of this, it has organized numerous conferences at international and national level to explore areas of collaboration with the GoN. These conferences deliberated on diverse topics- financial investment, tourism and trade, constitution and democracy, residency and citizenship- and submitted related reports to the GoN. These efforts were ad-hoc and scattered. NRNA believes there is an urgency to systematize the previous knowledge sharing efforts and mobilize the diaspora's knowledge pool to complement the GoN's development efforts. The mobilization will augment the country's knowledge base and help close the knowledge gap that the GoN and Nepal's private sectors consider impediments to their development objectives. It will also lead to knowledge transfer, investment, and long-term capacity building of the country.

The NRNA believes there will be an on-going need to update new knowledge and the growing expertise in the diaspora. It therefore proposes to hold such convention in every two years. The 1st NRN Global Knowledge Convention was organized by the Non-Resident Nepali Association (NRNA) in partnership with the Government of Nepal (GoN) on 12-14 October 2018 in Kathmandu, Nepal. The Rt Hon Prime Minister of Nepal Mr KP Oli inaugurated the Convention on the evening of 12 October. It was attended by the Federal Parliament of Nepal, former ministers, high-ranking government officials, senior authorities of universities and research institutions, leaders of private sectors, accomplished international, national and NRN experts and students. The convention was comprised of 27 presentation sessions. It covered four plenary and 15 symposium topics. 166 paper presenters and 78 panellists gave input to the Convention. About 400 participants from 21 countries attended this convention. The first GKC managed to bring together experts from Nepal, Nepali Diaspora and international community to share their experiences and prepare an action plan to help Nepal move towards knowledge-based economy.

Following the grand success of the 1st NRN Global Knowledge Convention 2018 in Kathmandu, NRNA is organizing the next 2nd NRN Global Knowledge Convention on 09-11 October 2020 in Kathmandu University, Nepal. The convention aims to bring together experts of various disciplines from Nepal, the Nepali Diaspora and international scientific communities to explore Nepal's needs for expertise to help the country move towards a knowledge-based economy. Similar to the first convention, the second convention will be co-organized in partnership with the Government of Nepal, and in collaboration with Nepal's education & research institutions, private sectors and other stakeholders. In addition, the second convention will endeavor to expand its horizon in all possible dimensions along with the realization of the new context brought by the unprecedented pandemic.

The convention will use Sustainable Development Goals set by the United Nations and the 15th five-year plan of National Planning Commission of Nepal to shape its objectives and goals. In the current context of the COVID-19 pandemic, the convention will discuss its socioeconomic impact on diaspora and resident Nepalis, and the challenges and opportunities it has brought in Nepal and around the world. The convention has reached out to Nepali stakeholders (GoN, Ministry of Education, Science & Technology, National Planning Commission, Nepal Academy of Science and Technology, Universities, Alumni Association, Research Centers, International Organizations, Private Sectors, Industries, Startups and Innovators) to explore the areas of collaboration and interest.

Amid the current COVID-19 pandemic crisis, the convention will be organized in a hybrid model. For participants who cannot attend the convention in person, it can be attended online.

The focus of the convention will be guided by four overarching themes:

- ♦ In-house Innovation for Societal Changes
- ♦ Science, Technology & Innovation Policy
- ♦ Start-ups and Commercialization Digitalized Economy

The convention will cover the following broader topical areas

- ♦ Emerging Science and Technology (Natural Sciences, Life and Health Sciences, Bio technology, Engineering, Information Science and Technology, Big Data & Artificial Intelligence)
- ♦ Public Safety (Environment and Climate Change, Road Safety, Pandemic and Natural Disaster Risk Management)
- ♦ Education and Social Sciences (Vocational Education, Good Governance, Women Equality & Youth Empowerment)
- ♦ Knowledge-based Economy (Finance, Investment, Innovation and Startups, IP Protection)

Centred around these subject areas, the conference will be organized in three parts: Inauguration, Plenary & Symposium sessions. The inaugural session will feature keynote speeches from internationally recognized experts on science and technology (S&T) research and, policy formation and implementation. High-profile global experts who have played a key role in the field of S&T development and technology transfer, and made significant contributions to their country's economic transformation, will address plenary sessions.

NEPAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION TRUST (NSFT)

1. BACKGROUND:

Nepal Science Foundation (NSFT) is one of the five divisions of the Skill, Knowledge and Technology (SK&TT) department. In pursuant to the NRNA policy to develop a long-term strategy of knowledge investment through the application of science and technology to meaningfully contribute to Nepal's development, NSFT division aims to achieve the above goal collaboratively with all stakeholders and the scientific community in Nepal and overseas, while maintaining a level of autonomy in its function.

This document outlines the function, scope, and structure of NSFT and its role. In an event of conflict of any provision contained in this ToR with the Constitution of the NRNA, the constitution should prevail. This document should be a working document that will evolve with time, with a periodical update and continual improvement, as and when deemed necessary. This document should be treated as a guideline and is an updated version of the previous version NSFT Terms of Reference.

2. OBJECTIVES:

- ◆ Provide feedback and advice in the area of S&T to NRNA, Governmental, and Private sectors of Nepal
- ◆ Formulate policy in science, knowledge and technology transfer in various sectors
- ◆ Develop SK&TT network with concern agencies of Nepal Government and other stakeholders
- ◆ Support R&D commercialization
- ◆ Develop patent portfolio for the protection of invention and commercialization.
- ◆ Network with educational institutions to support community science and create science awareness campaign.
- ◆ Support science communication and science education capacity in schools.

3. SPECIFIC TASK:

- ◆ Use knowledge, expertise and experience of diaspora community to support S&T activities in Nepal.
- ◆ Advocate and provide feedback to education and STI policy of Nepal.
- ◆ Conduct collaborative program and projects and help in technology transfer, drive innovation, start-up and licensing of the technology.
- ◆ Conduct science awareness campaign and school science capacity building program.
- ◆ Facilitate global scholar exchange program through joint supervision.
- ◆ Act as a conduit between Diaspora and Nepal educational and scientific communities and institutions.
- ◆ Organize a Global Knowledge Convention every two years to exchange and share experiences and develop networking.
- ◆ Communicate SK&TT activities to all stakeholders using effective mass media.
- ◆ Set up SK&TT NSFT network in all chapters.
- ◆ Undertake crowdfunding to raise S&T endowment and innovation Fund.
- ◆ Launch SK&TT journal.
- ◆ Implement MoU with NAST and sign MOU with MoS&T to develop an institutional relationship and run collaborative program.
- ◆ Develop SK&TT database.

- ♦ Create an online SK&TT discussion forum for regular updates, sharing of ideas and feedback.
- ♦ Prepare NRNA STI Status report.
- ♦ Regularly revisit, revise and update the SK&TT policy and procedure.

4. TARGETS:

- ♦ Prepare the NRNA Science and Technology white status report.
- ♦ Act as the single point of contact for the global Nepali diaspora for science and technology.
- ♦ Identify and initiate potential projects of national priority areas in Nepal.
- ♦ Undertake in house and collaborative, projects and program in relevant areas of interest and priority as outlined in section 1.2 of this ToR under Function, Scope and Structure.
- ♦ Exchange of scholars, joint supervision of PhDs, and postdoc research through specific projects.
- ♦ Launch NSFT Journal of Applied Sciences and other suitable publications.
- ♦ Prepare a comprehensive skills database of relevant professionals and stakeholders from the global diaspora and Nepal.
- ♦ Represent NRNA in Nepal Academy of Science and Technology (NAST) Academic Council, and Nepal Government's science and technology and relevant agencies.
- ♦ Build a strong networking relationship and partnership with concerned agencies (including but not limited to) of the Nepal Government and non-government sectors such as:
 - Ministry of Education, Science, and Technology (MoEST),

NRNA POLICY INSTITUTE (NPI) BY-LAWS FORMATION

1. BACKGROUND:

The Constitution of Non-Resident Nepali Association (NRNA) has envisioned the formation of NRNA Policy Institute, and articulated overarching principles and scope of it in the Article 20.6 of the constitution. According to the Article 20.6, the NRNA Policy Institute.

- ♦ will contribute to Nepal and NRNA in the Policy front on broad subject areas, categorically mentioned in the article as, Economic, Social, Commercial, Industrial, International Scenarios, Foreign and Diplomatic Areas, Good Governance, Environment, Agriculture, Tourism, Bio-diversity, and similar essential and useful areas.
- ♦ will be of international standard.
- ♦ can be established either in Nepal or any suitable country in the world.

In addition,

- ♦ Functioning and management of this institute will be governed through separate regulatory By-laws named “NRNA Policy Institute By-laws”.
- ♦ The By-laws will govern the institutionalization of “NRNA Policy Institute”, determine framework for its formation, determine its scope, duty, rights, necessary conditions, management of secretariat, allocation of human resources and their employment contracts.
- ♦ The By-laws will be within the purview of NRNA Constitution and in accordance with it.
- ♦ The By-laws will need to be endorsed by NRNA ICC and determine its activation date.

In order to form NRNA Policy Institute by implementing the guidance spelled out by the constitution, NRNA International Executive Secretariat (IES) formed a NRNA Policy Institute By-laws Formation Taskforce which is tasked to engage in wider consultation with broader Nepali Diaspora and prepare a robust NRNA Policy Institute By-laws.

2. OBJECTIVES:

1. Complete the formation of NRNA Policy Institute By-laws taskforce
2. Consult NRNA ICC and diaspora policy experts to solicit ideas on the formation of an effective policy institute
3. Produce the By-laws document and forward to NRNA ICC for approval and roll out

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION (VE)

1. BACKGROUND:

Non-Resident Nepali Association (NRNA) is an international organisation with a strategic goal in supporting the development and promotion of Nepal by attracting and facilitating NRNs' investment including foreign direct investment to Nepal and by transferring knowledge, skill and technology that the NRNs have gained in an organized and coordinated manner through its own organizational structure.

As per the new organisational structure (2019-21), NRNA has created eight Departments with a steering committee under each Department followed by functional committees. Vocational Education Committee (VEC), headed by Patron Ram Pratap Thapa, is one of them. The committee will work within the Skill, Knowledge and Technology Transfer Department of NRNA.

2. OBJECTIVES:

- ♦ Coordinate with and workout a strategic partnership with the local, provincial and federal government institutions to develop a feasible model that will provide highly needed vocational and technical skills to the vast majority of the youths of Nepal who are either unemployed or seeking skilled jobs.
- ♦ Create self-employment opportunities for freshly graduated or unemployed youths that finally would result in the retainment of the workforce for nation building.
- ♦ Play a role to give recognition to the degrees earned after specific training provided by the Vocational Training Centres run by joint effort of NRNA.
- ♦ Act as an alternative or parallel to the various initiatives taken by the mainstream Nepal Govt institutions including the CTEVT and other TEVT service providers.
- ♦ Supplement and compliment the initiatives being taken by transferring the Knowledge, Skill and Technology of the NRNs, who are residing in different parts of the world have gained.
- ♦ Develop Public and Private Partnership model to develop projects supporting vocational Education.

5. COLLABRATION AND DEVELOPMENT:

The planning for facilities development along with cost sharing from local stakeholders will be as follows:

- Local Government will provide land for developing facilities.
- CTEVT, in consultation with the NRNA, will prepare design and estimates for the facilities through hired technicians.
- Facilities will include a training hall to accommodate 20 trainees at a time, a hostel to accommodate 25 trainees plus trainers and support staff at a time, a kitchen and a dining hall big enough for at least 30 people, necessary toilets and bathrooms.
- Provincial government will bear the costs of the construction work.
- NRNA will provide, **a one off**, necessary furniture items, training tools and equipment, 2 computers, 1 printer, 1 photocopier, a digital smart board, a projector and a screen per centre and a comprehensive tool kit (as recommended by the trainers) to be provided to the pass out trainees.
- CTEVT, with support from the Steering Committee, will facilitate recruitment of 2 trainers and one support staff per centre.
- CTEVT will pay the salary of the trainers and support staff and Ministry of Education ensures that this is

incorporated in the annual government budget of the CTEVT.

- viii. Local government will provide annual budget for running costs including stationery, utility bills- water, electricity, gas, internet/ broad band, tea/ coffee etc.

6. INCORPORATION OF GOOD PRACTICES:

- i. Visit some of the technical Schools and training centres especially rural training Centre Simpani in Lamjung district and Bhimad in Tanahun district.
- ii. Make an inventory of the good practices of different Technical Schools and training centres run by both the CTEVT and the private sector in Nepal.
- iii. Incorporate the good practices in the pilot project plan.

7. PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION (IMPORTANT):

i. Short term Training program

- ◆ Once the pilot program is ready and agreed by all stakeholders, the facilities are in place, the human resources available the pilot project is to implemented.
- ◆ CTEVT will provide training curriculum to the centres.
- ◆ Centre trainers will run the training.
- ◆ Training will be 3 to 6 months long, depending the nature of the trade.
- ◆ CTEVT will make regular visits to the training centres for monitoring and quality control purpose. NRNA representatives may join the monitoring team.
- ◆ CTEVT Examination Division will administer the tests including the practical tests and provide certificates to the successful trainees.

ii. Long term Program (degree equivalent)

- ◆ Prepare a detail proposal on the opening of a model national pride training center with new facilities.
- ◆ The concept is to develop a technical university to generate hundreds of skilled human resources which can obtain a degree course as well if they desired.
- ◆ The proposal will be developed with the help of experts and various model will be presented; however, Germany or Korean model will be preferably used.
- ◆ Investment can be done as PPP model.

8. EVALUATION OF THE PILOT PROJECT:

An independent experts' team hired jointly by the CTEVT and NRNA will evaluate the whole process and practices of the Pilot Project and prepare a report with recommendations. Such recommendations will spell out the usefulness of such programme, if expanded in future.

9. SECOND PHASE OF THE PROJECT:

Based on the recommendations of the experts' evaluation report, this programme will be expanded in other parts of the country.

PHILANTHROPIC AND HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE (PHA) DEPARTMENT

1. BACKGROUND:

Philanthropy; an act of giving back to community, is essential part of human society. It is the compassion towards other living things that differentiates humans from other animals. All religions prescribe that the haves should part away with some portion of their wealth to be used in the interest of the have-nots. Philanthropy is different from exchange as the 'giver' does not expect anything material from the act of 'giving'. Modern day philanthropy has taken various form like humanitarian assistance given at the time of calamities, donations to foundations/educational/research/caregiving, charity extended to poorer sections of society, community support by large corporate bodies and so on. The focus seems to be not merely in giving but making it useful to the community at large and sustaining the process.

The Nepali people have a tradition of donation or giving. In the earlier days, most charity works involved construction of temples, gumbas, monasteries, resting places (Chautari, Pati and Sattals), water tabs and wells and so on. When they go outside their own village and become a little well off, they return to the village and support their community by contributing in building schools, libraries, public facilities etc. These charity works were mostly of individual nature and the emergence of NRNA as an association has tried to enhance the individual efforts of Nepalis living outside of Nepal, by making them of more collective nature.

The Non-Resident Nepali Association, a collective body of Nepalis residing outside of South Asian Region was established with the objective of facilitating the well-being of Nepalis wherever they live, has taken charity and Philanthropy as its core initiative. Whenever natural calamities like earthquake, flood, landslide or any other major calamity happens in Nepal, the NRN community has been one of the firsts to come in support of the fellow countrymen. The NRNA has been working in streamlining such gestures by collecting resources and relief materials from a varied and diverse group and putting that to use for distribution of relief. It has also undertaken projects like construction of an entire settlement, development of park, building of old age home, and supported many initiatives of building school, hospitals, organizing health camps, construction/development of libraries and so on. The NRNA has established a dedicated fund for helping those who fall victims in course of foreign employment. It has helped the members of the community who are languishing in jails or serving sentences in foreign prisons. Many NRNA chapters are undertaking charity works on their own. When a huge earthquake occurred in 2015, it mobilized a sizeable amount of resources which was used in relief and rehabilitation works. Many NRNs worked as volunteers in extending relief to the affected people.

NRNA managed to create dedicated Charity Fund in 2011-13, within the association and collected charitable funds to mobilize it in systematic way in different sectors in Nepal. NRNA also adopted the concept of One NCC One Charity Project during the declaration of 3rd NRN Global Conference 2007. Since then, NRNA is requesting its chapters to adopt one charitable project a term in Nepal and asked to send the report to ICC for the official records. Since then more than 500 charitable projects were conducted in different parts of Nepal. More than Rs. 350 million was recorded during the term 2013-15, 95 million Rupees was recorded during term 2015-17, 50 million Rupees was recorded during the term 2017-19 in the area of philanthropy.

The NRNA efforts are not confined to philanthropic activities in Nepal alone. The Association encourages its national chapters, members to be involved in philanthropic activities in the country they reside. Be it the storm hitting Japan, bush fires in Australia, COVID-19 effects or other natural calamities, the Nepali Diaspora has been active in extending humanitarian help to the affected people.

To encourage members and affiliates to be involved in philanthropic and humanitarian assistance activities

sustainably, the NRNA has created a special Philanthropic and Humanitarian Assistance Department with Vice President as its head. The following are the goals, objectives, main functions, working policy of the department.

2. GOAL:

The overall goal of the department is to streamline the PHA activities of the Association and its affiliates and members and make them sustainable to have maximum impact on the people. The PHA department aims not merely to mobilize resources and execute PHA projects but channelize them to areas which will have long term positive impact on the society. The PHA department shall in consultation with the wider NRNA community draft a PHA policy and strategy of NRNA and work for implementation of that policy (ensure that the PHA activities are executed as per the policy worked out).

3. OBJECTIVES:

- ◆ Conduct need analysis and identify areas of focus (priority) for NRNA (identify areas where the NRN community can contribute most).
- ◆ Work out a system of project selection, fund mobilization, project execution and monitoring.
- ◆ Identify and work for possible collaboration with other organizations.
- ◆ Identify ways of sources of fund and develop mechanism for sustainable fund collection.
- ◆ Encourage members/community to be involved in collaborative efforts rather than in individual charity works and channelize the works towards sustainability.
- ◆ Motivate the NCCs to be involved in philanthropic and humanitarian assistance in Nepal.
- ◆ Work out a plan of charity works of the Association and its affiliates.
- ◆ Identify projects which have made best impacts, communicate about them and encourage to replicate them.
- ◆ Ensure that each NCC of NRNA undertakes at least One Charity One Project in Nepal during the term 2019-21.
- ◆ Support in establishment of NRNA Foundation which shall provide sustainable source of fund for NRNA PHA activities.
- ◆ Establish a rapid response mechanism for responding to emergency situation and establish a fund for such emergencies.
- ◆ Encourage volunteerism among the community especially among the younger generation of NRNs.
- ◆ Create database and records of the contribution made in the field of PHA during the term from different parts of world.
- ◆ Work closely with the local social organizations in Nepal which work for philanthropic and humanitarian causes.

BLOOD TRANSFUSION SYSTEM (BTS)

1. BACKGROUND:

Blood Transfusion System (BTS) is one of the priority programs of the Government of Nepal (GoN). The Nepal Red Cross Society (NRCS) started providing the institution-based BTS through the Department of Pathology at Bir Hospital in 1964 and the first BTS was established as Laxmi Blood Bank in 1966. In recognition of the pioneering and long service of NRCS, in 1992, GoN mandated NRCS as the sole agency to conduct the blood programs in Nepal. A national policy on BTS was then developed and approved by GoN in 1993.

During the initial years, BTS service in Nepal was available only in Kathmandu but over the years, it has been expanded to 108 BTS Centers (BTSC) in 73 of the 77 districts of the country. Out of these 113 centers, one is functioning as NRCS Central BTS Centre (CBTSC). At present, BTS is being regulated by Central Blood Transfusion Service (CBTS) under NRCS. Ministry of Health and Population (MoHP) has established a regulated body, NBBTS, under National Public Health Laboratory (NPHL). The supply of safe and adequate blood and blood products has remained one of the main goals of the National Blood Program. The major limitations are the lack of technical expertise and the state-of-art facility in preparation of blood products required for any sort of demand. In current situation, the CBTS also lacks the availability of latest screening assays for supply of safe and quality blood or blood products.

With the objective to uplift the standards of BTS in Nepal, NRN bio-tech professionals working in different parts of the world teamed up voluntarily to form the BTS committee under NRNA. The team aimed to develop and establish a strategy for promoting safe and sustainable blood transfusion system in Nepal. NRNA BTS has already initiated project collaboration among the institutions like NBBTS (NPHL, MoHP), NRCS- CBTS, Netherlands Blood Supply Foundation Sanquin and funding partners like TBI Group. One of such is Tailor Made Trainings for staff of Central Blood Transfusion Service Center, NRCS; which is already in operation.

NRNA BTS is working in the sector of blood donation, blood donor motivation, quality enhancement, and equipment donation and strengthening the coordination with the local and international stakeholders of blood donation. The achievements of the BTS are remarkable and expected to be continued for working towards betterment of Blood Transfusion System in Nepal through the project: ***“Developing Safe and Sustainable Blood Transfusion System in Nepal”***

Hence, NRNA has decided to continue to work for betterment of the blood transfusion system in Nepal through its Blood Transfusion System (BTS) Taskforce in the tenure ICC 2019-21.

2. OBJECTIVES:

- ♦ Support in the development of donor screening and diagnostic assays for safe supply of blood and blood products as per demand.
- ♦ Support in expansion of production of different blood products as per demand in Nepal’s medical and surgical context.

NEPAL LIBRARY FOUNDATION (NLF)

1. BACKGROUND:

Nepal lacks a proper well-equipped library system supported by the government. As a result, a vast majority of Nepalis do not have access to libraries. The connection between a nation's development and the opportunity of its citizens to freely access information via the nation's library system has been well established.

NRNA recognized the importance of libraries in nation building and, in keeping with its mission to participate in Nepal's socio-economic development, in 2007, included provision of assistance in the development of public libraries as one of its charity projects. The "Nepal Library Foundation (NLF)", a registered charity in Canada, was retained by the NRNA to implement the Project. NLF, Canada works with NLF, Nepal, a registered NGO in Nepal.

In February 2016, NRNA set up a Task Force (TF) to review the scope and performance of the Project and recommend strategies to enhance its effectiveness. Since then NRNA is continuing its support towards NLF to implement its action plan. It also intends to start making financial contribution towards establishing new libraries. Currently, NRNA has included Nepal Library Project as one of the committees under its Philanthropic and Humanitarian Assistance Department.

2. OBJECTIVES:

- ♦ Create and strengthen reading habits in Nepalese including children and adults from different communities.
- ♦ Support both individual and self-conducted education as well as formal education at all levels.
- ♦ Provide opportunities for personal creative development.
- ♦ Stimulate the imagination and creativity of children.
- ♦ Promote awareness of cultural heritage, appreciation of the arts, scientific achievements and innovations.
- ♦ Provide access to cultural expressions of all performing arts.
- ♦ Foster inter-cultural dialogue and favor cultural diversity.
- ♦ Support the oral tradition.
- ♦ Ensuring access for citizens to all sorts of community information.
- ♦ Provide adequate information services to local enterprises, associations and interest groups.
- ♦ Facilitate the development of information and computer literacy skills.
- ♦ Support and participate in literacy activities and programs for all age groups, and initiate such activities if necessary.

EDUCATION SUPPORT FOR CHILDREN (ESC)

1. BACKGROUND:

Government of Nepal (GoN) has initiated a national campaign for giving education to all. The government leaders, high officials and business men are taking responsibility of poor and needy students to enable them to education opportunities. This campaign has drawn the attention of NRNA. Thus, NRNA has decided to jointly work with GON for the betterments of Children Education in rural areas of Nepal. NRNA has done MoU with Ministry of Education in 2019 for assisting the national campaign with the theme **Education for All**.

NRNA has conducted different activities under this Campaign during tenure 2017-19 in support of different NCCs. This campaign has demonstrated that the small contribution of diaspora; can bring remarkable change in the life of people of rural areas of Nepal. The financial support of Nepalese Diaspora has enabled thousands of poor students to continue their study. Hence this campaign is helping to link between poor and deprived community of Nepal. NRNA is continuing this noble campaign as one of the Task Force under Philanthropy and Humanitarian Assistance Department of ICC 2019-21.

2. OBJECTIVES:

- ◆ Support the needy students by providing bags, books and uniforms during the admission period in rural area.
- ◆ Guardianship of poor and deprived students by NRNs of same community.
- ◆ Enhance skill of teachers by providing them training.
- ◆ Provide nutritional food in terms of lunch package to poor students.
- ◆ Work together with policy makers to formulate the poor and rural friendly education policy.
- ◆ Establish E-libraries and information centers to make students more innovative and creative.

3. WORKING PROCEDURE:

The ESC Taskforce will work in the interest of poor students by adopting standard procedures as following:

- ◆ Identify the poor and needy students with the help of the school, local government and education ministry.
- ◆ Create database of the students.
- ◆ Explore list of the NRNs from same location and request NRNs for guardianship.
- ◆ Expected Cost:

1. For Class One to Five: **Total Rs. 6600/-**
Rs.3000 (For bags, books and uniform)
Rs. 3600 (Per month Rs.300 for stationery)
2. For Class Six to 9: **Total Rs. 9800/-**

Rs. 4800 (Per month Rs.400 for stationery)
3. For Class 10-12: **Total Rs. 14200/-**
Rs. 7000 (For bags, books and uniform)

SMART NRNA

1. BACKGROUND:

The NRNA has existed for over a decade and now is formally registered with the Government of Nepal (Ministry of Foreign Affairs) and has established National Coordination Councils (NCC) in 82 countries. As it moves forward to increased institutionalization and sustainability; NRNA recognizes the challenges and complexities it faces on managing NCC's, its members, their personal information/documents, office bearers activities, events, knowledge based information, and other different kinds of information.

As a legal entity registered globally in over 80 countries, NRNA needs to have information management system (SMART NRNA) which is consistent across all the organizational structures & geography to safeguard personal information provided by various stakeholders, to comply within national privacy and information management policies, to standardize and implement consistency among all the National Coordination Councils (NCCs).

This situation highlights the need to develop a greater focus and detailed strategies on information management systems and processes so that the NRNA is sustainable, result oriented, transparent, consistent, credible, responsible and relevant.

NRNA constitution has three levels of organizational hierarchy namely: International Coordination Council (ICC), Regional Coordinator (RC) and National Coordination Councils (NCC). Therefore, for the efficient, optimized and seamless collaboration of these teams, there must be central information management system which would allow the authorized stakeholders to manage information as per their assigned roles from the central repository which would ultimately enhance organizational operations.

Therefore, the organization realized the requirement to setup a SMART NRNA which would build a system / policy, procure required services to design, develop and deploy a centralized information management system for NRNA.

2. OBJECTIVES:

- ◆ Redesign current web portal.
- ◆ Emphasize and share all departments, their chairs, roles and activities through web portal.
- ◆ Build/Enhance Global Membership portal, including family membership.
- ◆ Build Mobile Application that allows to download NRNA Global ID cards and save in mobile wallets.
- ◆ Build Global Membership benefit portals to promote our partners who sponsors our membership benefits packages through hotels, restaurants, airlines, hospitals etc.
- ◆ Secure existing important documents in web/clouds and manage access privileges to authorized IES members and secretariat personals.
- ◆ Enhance existing Knowledge Conference portal and integrate.
- ◆ Other miscellaneous IT related tasks.

3. SCOPE:

The aim of this Committee is to identify, explore and develop information management systems and solutions to be used by ICC and NCCs in order to maximize the opportunities to achieve NRNA's goals and objectives and to implement NRNA President's Smart NRN vision. The following but not limited are the main objectives of this Committee:

- ♦ To explore, analyse and design information management strategy for the global use.
- ♦ To help NRNA on maintaining good governance through organizational integrity, consistency, transparency, credibility and sustainability by leveraging MIS System.
- ♦ To help NRNA to generate revenue, cut cost and share information by utilizing its platform and global network to provide opportunities for sponsors to reach out to our global NRNA members.
- ♦ To provide consistent & easy to use platform to the global NRNA members to manage their personal information in secure system.
- ♦ To retain membership, provide membership benefit and create data inventory of skill business data with consistency in all NCCs.
- ♦ To minimize duplication of process between ICC and NCC bodies for member's information management activities.
- ♦ To minimize the resources and costs required at NCC level for operation of different activities,
- ♦ To help NRNA secretariat to seamlessly collaborate with ICC and NCC bodies using this system.

4. TIME FRAME:

This Committee will be valid for current NRNA tenure (2019 - 2021) and may continue to work beyond this tenure if there is a requirement to continue it further with the endorsement from the future ICC councils.

5. ACTIVITIES:

The Committee will perform the following activities but not limited to:

- ♦ Liaise with NRNA ICC, NCC and secretariat to research, identify and explore the problems and inconvenience faced by relevant stakeholders in this area from system/information management point of view.
- ♦ Consult with selected group of users about their perception of the organization, convenience of using NRNA information systems such as websites, publications, membership management systems etc. etc.
- ♦ Develop information management strategies and policies based on above findings.
- ♦ Prepare, design and development documents for future references.
- ♦ Prepare training materials.
- ♦ Handover the solution to the NRNA secretariat and provide required training.
- ♦ Provide ongoing consultation if necessary.

6. ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

- ♦ Formulate SMART NRNA strategic policy plan, guidelines and ToR.
- ♦ Work closely with NRN ICC team and submit regular reports to ICC.
- ♦ Participate in ICC meetings as needed.
- ♦ Lead the team on devising strategy and liaise with all the relevant parties for successful completion of this project.

- ◆ Procure required resources to develop and deploy the proposed system.
- ◆ Continuously monitoring the progress and the quality of the work.
- ◆ Report all the problems / roadblocks faced by the committee the relevant stakeholders.
- ◆ Conclude the project and notify all the concerned stakeholders and SMART NRNA Team Members.
- ◆ Liaison with the various SMART NRNA project Committee team and provide strategic support for the successful completion of the project.
- ◆ Represent SMART NRNA in various meetings as assigned.
- ◆ Identify and develop the project proposal & plans.
- ◆ Submit the project proposal to SMART NRNA chair.
- ◆ Carry out the tasks as requested by committee chair.

7. REPORTING PROCESS:

- ◆ The SMART NRNA committee members will report all the activities to the SMART NRNA chair on regular basis.
- ◆ The SMART NRNA committee chair submits the progress report to ICC periodically, in every 90 days.
- ◆ The Chair updates the progress report at ICC meetings, Global and Regional Conferences as appropriate.

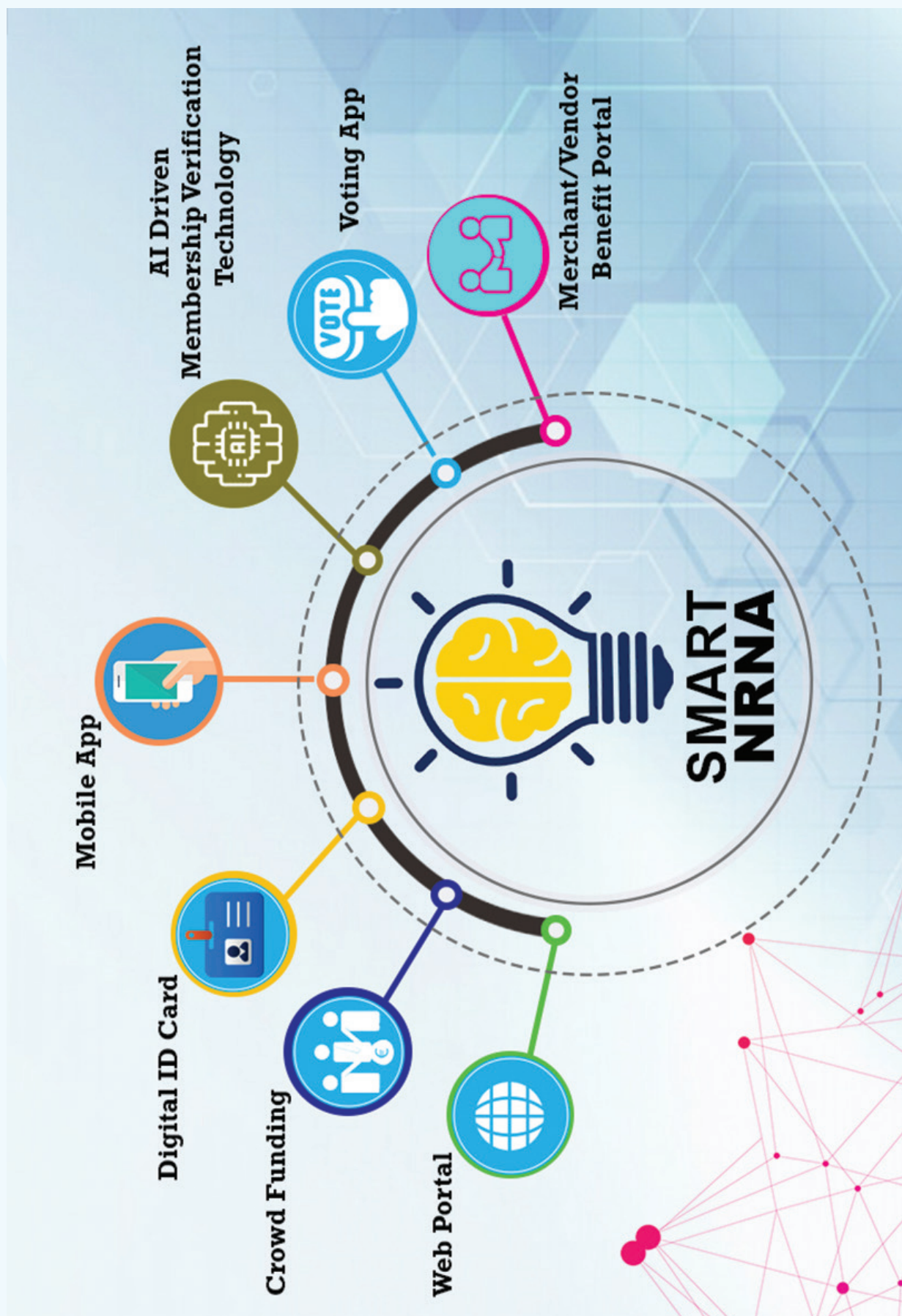

9. BUDGET AND FUNDING:

The committee will follow professional procurement due diligence process to award this service to the appropriate service provider with the approval of IES and financial guidelines as per NRNA Financial Rules and Regulations.

The cost of the project is estimated to be around RS 20 Lakhs.

1. BACKGROUND:

The meeting of the Non-Residents Nepali Association, International Coordination Council (NRNA ICC), held on 14th December 2019, decided to form a Global Members Benefit Campaign (GMBC). The same Meeting of the ICC also appointed Mr. Rajendra Kumar Sharma (QATAR) to serve as Chair of this committee.

A mandate has been given to the Chair to nominate members of the committee to complete the team for the tenure of 2019-2021. It was decided in the meeting that the committee is to prepare a Term of Reference (TOR) and get approval from NRNA ICC.

2. MISSION:

The mission of the committee is to improvise the current privileges and benefits for the NRNA members and expand the members from 90000 to 200000 globally within 2022 and up to 400000 within 2025. Ultimately, our target will be to register at least 10% of almost 6 Million Nepalese working abroad as the member of NRNA.

- ♦ Improvising the NRNA membership cards and switch the current physical cards with electronic card supporting e-wallet for the convenience.
- ♦ Establishing facilities for the renewal of membership cards online.
- ♦ Expand wide range of benefits for members to obtain discounts and privileged service in various renowned corporate sectors such as Hotels, Airlines, Airports, Financial Institutions, Hospital, Educational Institutes etc. globally.
- ♦ The GMBC shall strive to achieve its objectives through Campaigning, Networking, Developing, and potential Funding.

4. CAMPAIGNING:

The committee of GMBC shall work for the expansion of community by increasing the number of members globally. All the members, chairs and advisors of the GMBC shall actively participate in various programmes and gatherings organized by the Nepalese communities to encourage the Nepalese expatriates to be a member of NRNA.

5. NETWORKING:

The NRNA has a vast network of its members scattered in 80+ countries and six (6) regions of the world. GMBC shall strive to identify and extract network of influencers, entrepreneurs, owners and key personnel out of this global network. GMBC will facilitate meetings and or conference with key persons of governmental and private sectors such as Hotel, Airlines, Airports, Financial Institutions, Hospitals, Educational Institutes and various other sectors; requesting for the varieties of privileged services and discounts for NRNA members.

6. DEVELOPING:

It is found extremely necessary to improvise the current physical membership cards to electronic cards for the convenience and ease of access. Our aim is to switch the current cards to electronic cards which is supported by e-wallets and machine readable globally. Further, considering the importance of time, a platform facilitating

the online renewal of membership cards is of utmost importance. This will encourage the NRNs to continuously being involved with the community.

7. FUNDING:

GMBC shall work within NRNA and burgeoning entrepreneurs in Information Technology sectors for identifying and guiding to right funding platform. GMBC will actively promote initiatives which can serve as the source of funding specially for developing the platform for online renewals of membership cards. GMBC targets to collaborate within NRNA for the funding.

Last but not the least, GMBC will coordinate with companies and firms established by NRNs and others in Nepal and overseas to bring highest level of privileges and conveniences to NRNs.

8. RESOURCES AND TECHNOLOGIES:

The GMBC will utilize resources and technologies of NRNA ICC and NCCs for various kinds of activities (i.e. meetings, seminar, websites etc.).

9. EVALUATION:

The GMBC shall develop evaluation criteria to measure impact of its programs and publish them annually.

10. RESPONSIBILITIES:

- ◆ Develop and maintain open communications with stakeholders
- ◆ Establish a common action program piloted in one country and replicate the model to others
- ◆ Create sub committees in every NCC
- ◆ Prepare policies and procedures for the campaign.
- ◆ Set work plan
- ◆ Organize periodical meeting of the committee
- ◆ Report to the NRNA ICC regularly on the progress

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT AND SUSTAINABILITY (FMS) DEPARTMENT

1. BACKGROUND:

Finance is all about money, funds or resources that is required to run any start-up, entity or business or initiating any projects. It is the most important factor required by any type of organization; be it profit or not for profit, to smoothly run their day to day operations. Financial management is the process which involves planning, organizing, directing and controlling the financial activities and also optimum utilization of the funds. The efficient management of finance leads to sustainability of any organization or entity for long run. It is a great challenge to maintain financial sustainability of any social entities and associations; because of their motives being not for profit and to keep up with their vision, mission and objectives. Hence, non-profit organizations have to efficiently plan their long-term financial goals, strategies, and action plans which will help them to avoid unforeseen financial crisis and hardship in future.

The scope of NRNA is getting bigger day by day; since its establishment 16 years ago in 2003. It was started from a desk and now it has evolved into an umbrella global organization of Nepali Diaspora having 82 affiliations in different countries. With the growing size of Nepali Diaspora, the social responsibilities of NRNA is also expanding, so is the financial obligations. NRNA has been actively contributing to Nepal and Nepali community directly and indirectly, by mobilizing different kind of resources and initiating different projects.

The issue of financial sustainability of NRNA has been raised since 2007 and different taskforce and committees were formed look into these issues. Dispite various challenges the association has been able to manage its financial issues and has been contributing to nation and Nepali community in all possible ways.

At present, the management of finance of the association and its sustainability has become a crucial agenda. Current International Coordination Committee is aware of the current financial position of the association and its financial obligation too. Considering the importance of the issue, ICC has decided to form a separate department to handle the issue of financial aspects including its efficient management and plans for sustainability under the leadership of the current Treasurer.

FUND GENERATION

1. BACKGROUND:

Since its establishment in 2003, the scope of NRNA has become bigger every passing day. Today, NRNA has become global organization of Nepali Diaspora expanding its National Coordination Council in 82 countries. With the growing size of Nepali Diaspora, the financial obligations of the association is also growing. NRNA has made many commitments in recent days, which includes flagship projects and also taking up the mega projects which were initiated in previous terms. Such projects demand huge amount of financial commitment and investment from NRNA. At the other side, the source of income of NRNA is limited to memberships, contributions, grants and sponsorship. It is projected that the current sources of income of NRNA might not be enough for the financial stability of the association. Hence the International Coordination Council (ICC) decided to form the dedicated committee to take charge of fund raising for taking up its projects and regular tasks.

2. OBJECTIVES:

- ◆ Explore different fund-raising possibilities for the association.
- ◆ Motivate members and well-wishers to donate funds to different social projects.
- ◆ Follow up with the members and different agencies for due collections.
- ◆ Collaborate with different organization and agencies for development projects.
- ◆ Organize international conference and training programs on pay basis.

- ♦ Prepare policy and regulation concerning infrastructure development to NRNA projects.
- ♦ Evaluate different aspects (including environmental, social and other) of the project as per need set by the Project Selection and Administering Committee.

PROJECT SELECTION

1. BACKGROUND:

The Non-Resident Nepali Association's (NRNA) mission is to contribute to the socio-economic development of Nepal by, amongst other, supporting human development (charity) projects in the country. Interested NRNs may request the NRNA for support to charity project(s) of their choice. NRNA will evaluate such requests based on its project evaluation criteria and notify the proponent if the request is supported. A selected project will be designated as "NRNA Project".

Hence, the Project Selection Committee has been formed by the ICC 2019-21 to support in finalizing such projects which are to be adopted or implemented by the NRNA. This committee will prepare papers listing the minimum criterion a project must meet to secure NRNA's support. It describes NRNA's project request evaluation methodology to select projects and provides an overview of the obligations of the proponents of "NRNA Projects" and the extent of support the proponents can expect from the NRNA. This committee recommends decision to ICC based on the report of feasibility study and the technical and financial evaluation report.

2. OBJECTIVES:

- ♦ Draft project adoption policy, procedures and workflow.
- ♦ List out the possible sectors for adopting project.
- ♦ Clearly define the features of the project to be adopted.
- ♦ Conduct feasibility study of the project to be adopted by NRNA.
- ♦ Mention the role and responsibility of NRNA while adopting the project.
- ♦ Investigate the details of the projects using the tools mentioned in the policy.
- ♦ Recommend for the selection of the project based on the findings and reports submitted by Technical Committee.
- ♦ Implement project adoption policy in all the projects to be run by NRNA.
- ♦ Forward the findings of the adopted project to the Monitoring and Evaluation Committee facilitate tracking the execution of the project.

4. FEATURES OF NRNA PROJECTS:

- ♦ Proposed projects should describe the needs, problems, benefits, co-operators and sponsors, estimated costs and the type of service requested.
- ♦ Proposed Projects should be SMART (Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic, Time Bound)
- ♦ NRNA will not support any project with a religious or political bias.
- ♦ All requests for support must include a completed information as stated in Clause No. 8 Parameters.
- ♦ Proponents (Project Champion) of projects, which are not currently amongst “NRNA Projects”, may request for support, provided they meet the criterion applicable to other charity projects.
- ♦ NRNA may carry out a project with its own forces or authorize the project’s proponent (Project Champion) to execute the project through a legally recognized agency appointed by NRNA.
- ♦ The number of projects selected by NRNA every two years will depend on NRNA’s projected financial and administrative capacity in the two years ahead. Evidently, only a limited number of projects will be selected for adoption.
- ♦ Projects should be within NRNA’s vision, missions and objectives (Possible projects are as stated in Clause 9)
- ♦ Project will be selected only after the recommendation of Technical Review of Projects Committee.
- ♦ The Project Determination team will develop an evaluation matrix and assign scores under each criterion.

5. PRIMARY SELECTION CRITERIA:

The following will be the primary criterion for selected:

- ♦ Projects within NRNA’s vision, missions and objectives
- ♦ Policy Related Issues requested by GoN.
- ♦ Long term sustainability of the project especially multi-donors e.g. GoN, International Organization, Private Sectors etc.
- ♦ Extent of public impact of the project and demography of the people likely to be impacted.
- ♦ Projects reliable financial resources and credible project management.
- ♦ Experience of the project proponent (Project Champion) on similar projects.

6. NRNA’S RESPONSIBILITY:

- ♦ Promote adopted projects in all of its public forums and, where coordination with the government is required in the course of the execution of the project, facilitate the coordination.
- ♦ Encourage NRNs considering supporting a charity project to work with the proponent of the appropriate “NRNA Project” or the Chair of the appropriate Task Force. (This will avoid duplication of efforts and bring synergy in our work).
- ♦ Consider provision of financial support to long-term projects that incur significant operating expenses.
- ♦ Monitoring and Evaluation of the projects.
- ♦ Establish a separate tab of “NRNA Projects” in NRNA website and post progress report from the “NRNA Projects” in the website after they are approved by NRNA.
- ♦ Provide adequate time slots in NRNA conferences (Regional and Global) to present progress on adopted projects to a larger audience.
- ♦ NRNA may de-list the project from the “Adopted List” should it find the project not in compliance with “Project Selection Policy”.

7. PROJECT PROPONENTS (PROJECT CHAMPION) RESPONSIBILITIES:

- ◆ Recognize the project as NRNA Project supported by contribution from NRNs in all their presentations, public statements and publications.
- ◆ Submit project progress report to NRNA's Project Selection Committee, NRNA Secretariat and to the Chair of the Project every six months or as per agreed project document.
- ◆ Facilitate on-site monitoring of progress by the Monitoring and Outcome Evaluation Committee

- ◆ Who will monitor the progress of the project? Who will do it?
- ◆ What kind of support is expected from NRNA? Duration of the support?

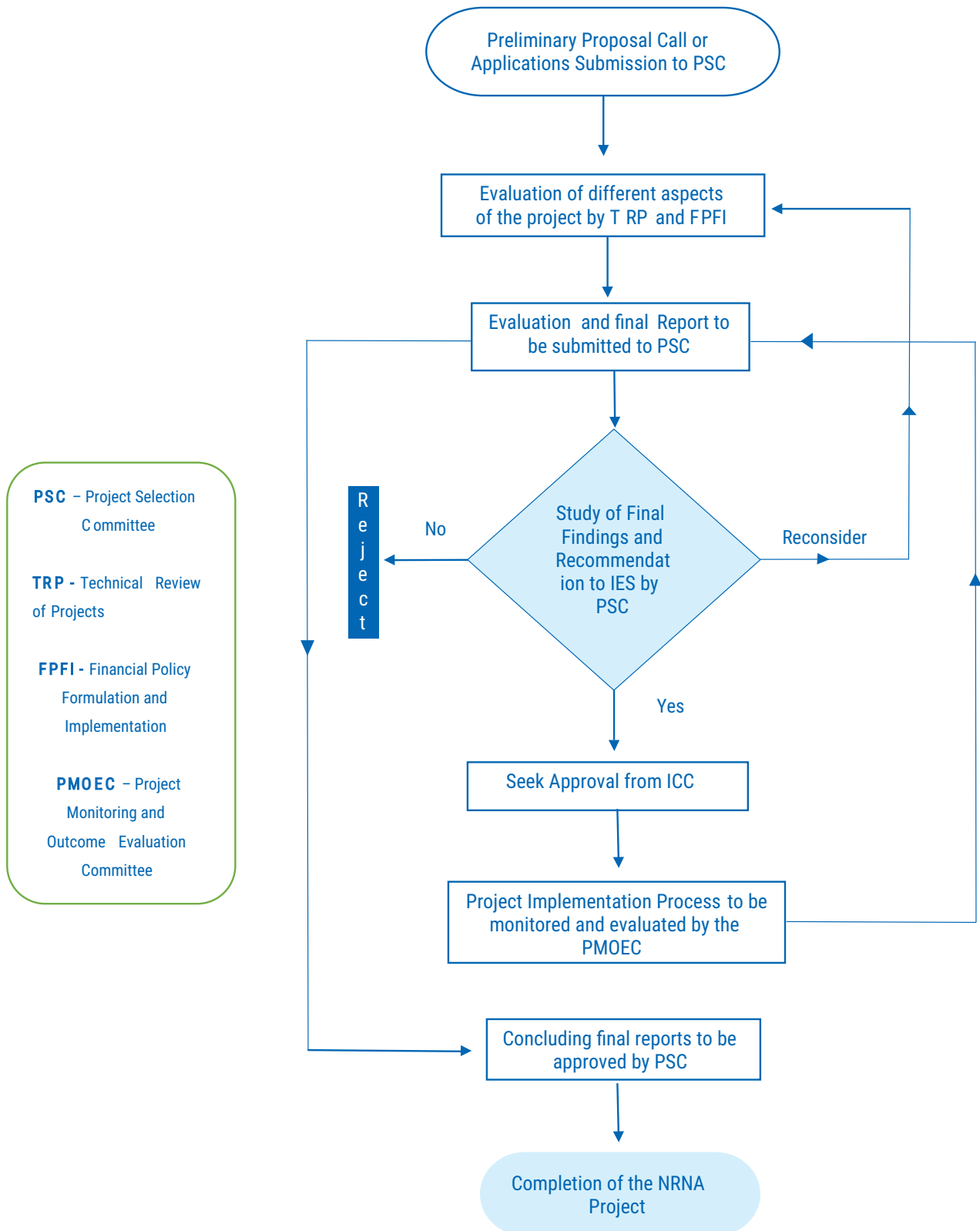

NRNA HUB SERVICES

Non-Resident Nepali Association (NRNA) was established with the purpose of uniting and binding the Nepali Diaspora under one umbrella on 11 October 2003. In the course of completing 16 years of its existence NRNA has developed into a non-governmental global organization and a network of Nepali origin by establishing National Coordination Council (NCC) in 82 countries to represent its interests, concerns and commitments. The network of Nepali Diaspora represented by NRNA has developed itself into a formidable force that can represent Nepali interest globally. Keeping all these in mind, the Government of Nepal has given legal status to Nepali Diaspora by promulgating Non-Resident Nepali Act 2064. For practical purposes Nepali citizens living outside South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC) member countries or People of Nepali Origin (PNO) holding foreign nationality other than SAARC nations are considered as Non-resident Nepalese (NRNs)

The initial impetus of the NRNA was to invest knowledge, Technology, Expertise and capita of NRNs in Nepal. Equally important objective of the association is to support in the economic development of Nepal by philanthropic projects, investments to create jobs, lobbying for international capitals on behalf of Nepal and advocating for investment conducive policies and regulations for foreign investment.
